

## A Message from the Superintendent of Schools

Dear NNCS Families, Friends, and Neighbors,

On March 22nd the Board of Education adopted a proposed spending plan for the coming 2022-2023 school year. This newsletter will help you understand where the money comes from and how we propose to spend it as well as its impact on you, the taxpayer. A full copy of the budget is available from the district office and on our website.

The planning cycle for the 2022-2023 school budget, which began in December, was significantly impacted by the passing of the NYS Budget. Norwood-Norfolk CSD is 70% funded by the state and we received notice of an increase to our state aid funding. This is welcomed as we've been traditionally underfunded. We're pleased that NYS plans to fully fund their public schools with a three-year phase-in of aid. This will have a tremendous impact on our children and their educational program.

For the past nine years we have kept our local share below a 0% increase per \$1,000 assessed value and we have always complied with the tax cap formula. Our Full Value Tax Rate is the lowest it's been since the 2003-2004 school year. The 2022-2023 budget has a **0.0% tax levy increase**. We are also asking approval from the voters to allow the district to maintain our bus replacement schedule. Keeping our buses on a seven-year cycle provides savings on maintenance costs while maximizing trade in values. In the same thinking, we're asking to begin two new reserve funds which will help mitigate future expenses with bus and equipment purchases.

The guiding force of our school district is the Board of Education. In the following pages you will find information about the candidates seeking election. You will also find details of the budget hearing and annual vote on the cover of this newsletter. Please participate thoughtfully in the process. Your informed involvement is important to the future of this district. Please reach out to me if you have any questions or concerns.

On a personal note, I thank you for the opportunity of continued service to the Norwood-Norfolk community. This is a special place with many devoted and caring people.





## **3-Part Budget Summary**




3-Part Budget for 2022-2023

The budget is divided into three components; administrative, program and capital, in accordance with the Commissioner of Education Regulations.

The <u>Administrative Budget</u> includes expenses necessary to manage District affairs including Board of Education, Superintendent, District Clerk, Business Office Operations, Legal/Auditing Fees and Building Level Supervision.

The <u>Program Budget</u> includes expenses necessary to educate students. Included in the program budget are expenses for classroom instruction, educating students with special needs, library services, nurses office, computer assisted instruction, Guidance Counselor Services, Athletics and Extracurricular Activities, and Transportation.


The <u>Capital Budget</u> includes all expenses necessary to operate and maintain the School Facilities. Examples include maintenance and custodial staff, utilities and debt payments for building projects.







\*In the event voters reject a district's proposed budget twice, the Board of Education must enact a contingent budget consisting of "ordinary contingent expenses" which is subject to a cap on the administrative portion of the budget, with no increase in tax levy over the prior year. Assumptions have been made in estimating the contingency budget pursuant to section 2023 of the Education Law. Changes made from the proposed budget are in compliance with this law. Should the proposed budget be defeated, the responsibility for determining which items in a school district fall under the concept of "ordinary contingent expenses" rests with the board of education. New equipment purchases totaling \$82,350 and exempt salary increases of \$3,593 are eliminated under the contingent budget.

Estimated Basic STAR Exemption Savings (The basic school tax relief exemption is authorized by section 425 of the Real Property Tax Law). The 2022-2023 maximum savings can not increase more than 2% over the prior year. The maximum STAR savings for each school district is calculated by the Office of Real Property Tax Services (ORPTS) and is available online at <a href="http://www.tax.ny.gov">http://www.tax.ny.gov</a>. Within each school district, the maximum savings may vary by municipality and/or class.

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2022-23 by the qualified voters of the Norwood-Norfolk Central School District, St. Lawrence County, New York, will be held in the District Board Room in said district on Tuesday, May 17, 2022 between the hours of 12:30 PM and 8:30 PM, prevailing time in the Norwood-Norfolk Central School, at which time the polls will be opened to vote by voting ballot or machine. To be a qualified voter, a person must be a U.S. citizen who is 18 years of age or older and a resident of the school district for at least 30 days prior to the vote.



## **Resolutions for Voters**

## Proposition 1: Budget Resolution:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Norwood-Norfolk Central School District be authorized to expend the sum set forth in the amount of \$25,973,407 and to levy the necessary tax therefore.

## <u>Proposition 2: Transportation</u> Resolution

RESOLVED, Shall the Board of Education purchase and, at the option of the Board, finance three (3) student transportation vehicles at an estimated cost not to exceed \$362,000 including necessary furnishings, fixtures, and equipment of all other necessary costs incidental thereto and to expend a total sum not to exceed \$362,000 which is estimated to be the total maximum cost thereof, and levy a tax which is hereby voted for the foregoing in the amount of \$362,000, which shall be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board Education and in anticipation of the collection of such tax, bonds, notes or installment purchase contracts are hereby authorized to be issued or executed at one time, or from time to time, in the principal amount not to exceed \$362,000 and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on said obligations when due.

## Proposition 3: Vehicle Reserve

RESOLVED, Shall the Board of Education of the Norwood-Norfolk School Central District, authorized to establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law to be titled "2022 Vehicle Reserve Fund" for a seven-year term in an amount not to exceed \$2,300,000, inclusive of accrued interest and other investment earnings, to be used for school vehicle and bus purchases. such reserve fund to be funded from (i) year-end budget surplus funds known as unassigned fund balance, as available, for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022

and each fiscal year thereafter for the term of the reserve fund, (ii) transfers of excess monies from Board of Education designated reserves, (iii) amounts from budgetary appropriations from time to time, and (iv) New York State Aid received and made available by the Board of Education from time to time, all as permitted by law.

#### <u>Proposition 4: Equipment</u> <u>Reserve</u>

RESOLVED. Shall the Board of Education of the Norwood-Norfolk Central School District. authorized to establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant Section 3651 of the Education Law to be titled "2022 Equipment Reserve Fund" for a ten-year term in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000, inclusive of accrued interest and other investment earnings, to be used for District purchases, equipment reserve fund to be funded from (i) year-end budget surplus funds known as unassigned fund balance, as available, for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022 and each fiscal year thereafter for the term of the reserve fund, (ii) transfers of excess monies from Board of Education designated reserves, (iii) amounts from budgetary appropriations from time to time, and (iv) New York State Aid received and made available by the Board of Education from time to time, all as permitted by law.

<u>Proposition 5:</u> Resolution for the election of Board of Education members. There will be three openings for three-year terms.

## **Voting Information**

## **Eligibility to Vote**

To be a qualified voter, a person must be a U.S. Citizen who a valid ballot application no later than May 10, 2022 if is 18 years of age or older and a resident of the school district the absentee ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or May 16, for at least 30 days prior to the vote.

## **Absentee Ballots**

Qualified voters may apply for absentee ballots through the District Clerk's office. To request an absentee ballot application, please contact Jill Weaver, District Clerk, at (315) 353-6631, ext. 38733, or email <u>iweaver@nncsk12</u>. org. Voters may request an absentee ballot based upon fear of contracting COVID-19. A list of persons to whom absentee ballots have been issued will be available for inspection in the district clerk's office during each of the five days prior to the day of election, except Sunday. To be issued an absentee ballot, the District Clerk must receive 2022 if requested and received in person.

Voting on the 2022-23 budget and annual election of candidates for the Board of Education will be held in the District Board Room on Tuesday, May 17, 2022 between the hours of 12:30 PM and 8:30 PM.
